



SENATE BILL 1000

In September 2016, then-Governor Brown signed Senate Bill (SB) 1000, which added a new requirement for local jurisdictions, including Contra Costa County, to address environmental justice as a required topic in the General Plan. By law, the County's General Plan Update will be required to identify:
